












#### **Message From The Commodore**


















#### **OTB Beach results and report**














#### **Keel Boat News**














# Flinders Yacht Club The joys of FYC membership 15/16














#### Sweeny adventure to Refuge Cove

On April 13 Coromandel sailed out from Flinders on a cruise to Refuge Cove crewed by Hugh and John Sweeney. This adventure challenge was most memorable and great experience in planning for safe passage in what we know as sometimes hostile waters. Sailing into dusk then through the night, brilliant sunsets, the dawn lights, abundant sea life and just the wild beauty of Bass Strait, The Prom and Refuge Cove were all magic moments enjoyed throughout the voyage.

We left the Nobbies at 1330 Wednesday and headed south east for our destination. As expected breezes were from S/SE over the afternoon and prevailed into the night at 12 to 15 knots in 1.5 to 2.0 meters of swell. Although a tad on the nose and requiring a number of tacks in the night the trip was most comfortable and the auto helm a blessing enabling time for watch and rest. Night sailing was a first time experience and at all times we felt quite safe as Coro bounded along in what was quite a dark night. With GPS and our maintaining position on charts, we could also see the far distant lights as we progresses along passing the Capes Woolami, Patterson, Liptrap and to arrive in the morning some 10 NM from the northern end of the famous Prom Glennies islands. At this time we were greeted by some 30 to 40 dolphins that played about Coro's bow enjoying the splash. From the Gelnnies in daylight we progressed as hoped in relatively calm waters and about a 8 knots of breeze to round the Prom into the shipping lanes and then on to Refuge. We arrived there at 1530 safe but tired after a 26 hour journey where we averaged 4.5 knots SOG.














#### Sweeny adventure to Refuge Cove



Refuge Cove was a delight with scenic walks, fishing and sea life and our own resident seal that played about Coro during our 3 night stay over. As tradition calls we posted Coro's name on the beach boards alongside all the names of visitor sailing boats to Refuge over the many years. Plans for the return journey were again all about the weather in particular drawing on datum wind speed and direction, swell and synoptics. We got this after a climb to The Rock where we could collect G3 signal. After a days delay to plan good weather we left Refuge Sunday morning 1030 on NE/E of 15 knots, passed Cape Wellington, SE Point and again rounded The Prom and Anser Island in safe seas and weather. From the Glennies under spinnaker we then headed on a north west lay line and in the afternoon and throughout the night the winds lifted to the expected 20 to 25 knots SE providing a driving push towards home. So the conditions were sustained and solid and with swell of 2.5 to 3.0 meters and a SE current. It was a thrilling sail as Coro flew home with sessions reaching 8 knots. We arrived at The Nobbies in the early morning in darkness and were amazed at the abundance of shipping navigational lights in the cliffs of the Gunnery and channel markers. We reached our Flinders mooring at 0230 Monday April 18 after a brisk fun night sail of 16 hours averaging 6.3 knots.

A great time and super bonding experience.

#### Easter 2016 **KB Ian Freeland Memorial Series.**

Weather was perfect for a little sail around our Kennon Cove over two days this Easter. Mild 10 knot breezes from the South. Sunny, for summer's last gasp before winter sets in? Our modern forecasting makes course setting a reliable function now, with advice from Cape Schank, No 8 channel mark, BoM, and Balnarring Bight weather station. Complement that with observation as you drive down the hill to our clubhouse to hang the course board number from the Freeland Tower, fly the flags and set up the start/finish video. While 'you can't change the wind, you can alter the set of your sails to suit'. Wasabi, Valkyrie, and Super Goof did this to great effect, relishing the 35' windshift after the starts. This wind shift on both days led to no need for any real tacking, so the catamaran could fly up and down the course, and the full keel yachts weren't held back so much upwind by their larger wetted surface. All right for some, but upwind flyers Act of Faith, Scaramouche and Foxy lady were left wallowing by comparison. J70 was pretty happy and had the kite working well.

The big black kite on Andrews boat is pictured in full flight, apparently the knack is to give up on the furler and launch from the bag the old fashioned way. Meanwhile, Wasabi has its kite worked out; the importance of keeping tension on the furling rope and have Alex as reliable crew- for when it is flying, it flies. The Act on Saturday gave his kite its first fly for the season and managed a tight wineglass tangle on each of the four jibes, to end up not too much the worse off for having tried it. Lesson learnt though and Tedd has sworn off the infernal thing for at least 10 more years. Super goof knows his kite and Ant used it quietly and effectively. Sue on Foxy had a monster light number one jib so no need for kiting, but instead had the handicap of 4 skippers for crew making 5 decision makers. She obviously wasn't troubled by their gratuitous advice and held a solid second in race 1 to the flying Wasabi. Alan on Scaramouche has finished the Adelaide commitment for the time being and was able to get a good weekend on the water so his handicap may better reflect reality for next season.

Clay and Dawsy were very happy with the courses and were free with their bribes to the handicapper afterwards. Another half of the fleet wanted the handicapper's blood for such a crappy course, so on average everyone was happy? That's yacht racing! The deck after both races was jolly and full of fun as experiences were shared and advice for improvement freely given. Helsie's little snacks were enjoyed with a drop of whatever you bought. Grant had helped Sue and Jo and Linda with finish times, thanks heaps, and there was much interest for the results on the Sunday. The handicapper usually needs a few days to steel himself for this task, the real result of a happy time on the water already having been awarded. But with the help, encouragement, indeed pushiness of Wasa's Rae, Super's Ant and Scara's Kate the task was done in quick time, the victors duly and deservedly saluted, lauded and hurrahed









#### Discovering Ian Freeland — Who built the tower?

Sitting on the club deck under Dino's shade sail nestling a can of Cooper's Light watching a full tide to welcome a visiting yacht anchor, the thought came 'how good was this weekend? We can only enjoy this thanks to all those before who created this club and its amenity. Cheers to lan Freeland and his control tower - the plaque up there says so. I wondered, so who was this bloke? In all matters historic the first port of call is Ken Lacey. He thought '...there was something about World War II bombers and being architect for a big Melbourne firm. Ian was part of our 'Geriatric Gardeners' with Charles Byrne, who'd tidy up about the club. He was a doer, who shirked credit. Ian died on John Iles' Careel 22 with Chris Moran. Ian designed the tower, I remember we paid \$20 per step to help fund the build.' Brian Coleman was in the Air Force for 30 years starting in 1951. He flew Mustangs, then the new jet Meteors and Sabres, went off to Korea, then Malaysia for 3 years ending up in Hercules aircraft. Brian had quite a story too, but despite many hours with Ian he really didn't know much of him. Except that he was a quiet modest achiever who loved sailing and Flinders. Ant Grage found him a great supporter of the club who enjoyed crewing on all the boats. Ant had a few walks along the beach beseeching him to stand for Commodore to no avail. Ant recalled something about Bomber command, maybe Lancasters. John lles enjoyed lan as a friend and crew. 'It was out near the Pilot Buoy with Ian on the foredeck dropping the kite when he collapsed on the deck. Chris got him into the cockpit and we radioed for help. Everyone was at the jetty with the ambulance but perhaps he was gone before he even hit our foredeck. As Commodore I put the little plague up in the tower remembering Ian. He just came up with the idea the club could do with a Tower for Race Control, designed it and supervised working bees to put it up. John Alsop worked with Ian for decades 'he was a renaissance man with a high interest in the outdoors, nature. A fantastic guy'. "After the war Ian was still in his early 20's and someone suggested Ian would make a good Architect. He enrolled at the Gordon Institute, now Deakin University, at Geelong where he grew up. By now he had a wife, Pat, and child, and he moved to Melbourne when my father, through a mutual friend, offered him a position in Dad's Architectural practice in Melbourne, which was very busy in the post war boom. Ian became a partner, and stayed with the firm until his late 60's, making an enormous contribution to the practice. His particular projects including being Faculty Architect for Veterinary Science and Agriculture at Melbourne University. Another significant project was the Darwin Court House. When Ian should have become Managing Partner he stepped aside and said to me he would rather be number two, I found him great support with his quiet way and wisdom. When he spoke at partnership meetings we all listened. He and Pat had two daughters and a son, but one daughter tragically died in the early 60s when she contracted encephalitis while family camping on the Murray. Ian kept flying after the war, both for work with country projects.









#### Discovering Ian Freeland — Who built the tower?

His aerial safari's through northern Australia with other mates in other aircraft became famous. Ian and Pat bought a small cattle farm in Point Leo Road, Red Hill and built a weekend retreat there. Years earlier Ian took up sailing with his young children and built a mirror dinghy. He sailed for many years from Mornington Yacht Club on a very fine Sparkman and Stephens 36, "Bandit of Bass Straight", both around the sticks and off shore, many summers doing the Devonport or Hobart races. I was sailing at FYC with the late Bob Boynton on his Cole 26 "Avanti", and we invited Ian to join us. When Bob sold Avanti we all joined David Kennedy on his Beneteau Quickmatch, had great fun and did well, Russell Barret being our helmsman. Ian was superb to have on a boat, a good helmsman, a good tactician and particularly good with sails. He also enjoyed the after race drink, but was never one for a big crowd. In the 50 years I knew him we had a lot of time together, in the practice, flying, sharing farming experiences and of course sailing. I knew him very well. In this time he never once spoke of his wartime experience, nor the daughter he lost. He took these very hard, and when you think about it he enlisted as a very sensitive teenager and saw terrible destruction and shocking injury to his companions. I know it took Ian years after the war to socially be at ease, but he never emotionally got over it. He was a very fine man with everything he did." To complete the sketch of Ian, the war path needed to be followed. Rory is thirty something and quite tech savvy. Frustrated with computers he advises me to keep clicking until it works. Onto the War Memorial website in Canberra and eventually with his advice get some results- 'lan Andrew Freeland was born in Geelong and had a brother. In his early twenties after pilot training, he is assigned to 44th Bomber Squadron. His officer's report finds him an average officer who could improve his paper work. He is mentioned in RAAF Honours and Awards- Distinguished Flying Cross. The citation describes one example, there were more than one, where "before reaching the target, a synthetic oil plant in Politz, they were attacked by two enemy fighters, severely damaged and set on fire. All turrets were put out of action, the starboard elevator and rudder shot away and the port wing and flap damaged. Although in consequence the aircraft was difficult to control, he pressed on and successfully bombed the target. Later the fire was extinguished and the crippled bomber flown safely back to base where Flying Officer Freeland made a masterly landing without the use of the air speed indicator or flaps. Throughout his operational career this captain of aircraft has displayed outstanding gallantry, tenacity and devotion to duty, setting an inspiring example to members of his crew." Seems he'd done enough leading for one lifetime, indeed, Lest We Forget, and thanks Ian Freeland.


